
MENA, Caribbean and British Overseas Territories Current Status and Outlook - Temperature


Current Status:

Over the last three months, warmer than normal conditions have been observed across the MENA, Caribbean and Southern Europe. The exceptions to this are in Yemen, Central Indian Ocean and Central Pacific Ocean where conditions have been colder than normal.

Outlook:

For the next three months, warmer than normal conditions are likely across MENA and the Caribbean. However, colder than normal conditions more likely across Guyana.


Current Status:


The last three months have been the dry season across much of the MENA with very little rainfall observed. The exception to this has been parts of Yemen and Oman which have been wetter than normal over the past few months. Near-normal or drier than normal conditions have continued across the Caribbean and Southern Europe.

Outlook:

For the next three months, near-normal precipitation is likely across Yemen and Oman. The rest of the MENA region is likely to be drier than normal. Drier than normal conditions are likely across the Caribbean and parts of eastern Mexico. Meanwhile, wetter than normal conditions are likely across most inland areas of South America including Guyana.

North Atlantic Tropical Cyclone outlook (Hurricanes): For the September to February period, near to slightly above average activity is the most probable outcome, with storms perhaps preferentially affecting the Gulf of Mexico where there are currently above-average sea surface temperatures. 
Global Outlook - Temperature

Outlook:

Over the next three months, many regions are likely to be warmer than normal, consistent with the warming observed over the past decade.

There are some notable exceptions to this with colder than normal conditions likely across tropical regions of South America, southern Australia and some parts of southern Africa.

Global Outlook - Rainfall

Outlook:

Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD) - A negative IOD event is established and is expected to persist for the next three months, returning to neutral by December, as is typical of the usual IOD seasonal cycle. This means that the western Indian Ocean is currently cooler than usual, while the east is warmer. This affects meteorological patterns over wide areas of the globe: the negative IOD leads to wetter conditions in Indonesia and Australia and drier conditions in Fast Africa.


El Niño-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) - ENSO is currently neutral, however, a La Nina is expected to re-establish during the northern hemisphere winter. NOAA Climate Prediction Center / NCEP predictions give a small chance of La Niña emerging in September, rising to a 70% chance of emerging November to January – more than double the normal risk – and lasting through the 2021-22 Northern Hemisphere winter.

Typically, the suppression of rainfall over the tropical Pacific Ocean associated with the La Nina, leads to increases in rainfall across the tropical land areas.

Over the next three months, large parts of southern Asia, Australasia, northern parts of South America, along with southern parts of Africa are likely to be wetter than normal.

Meanwhile, parts of Central and East Africa and the Middle East are likely to be drier than normal.



Current Status – Temperature percentiles





Orange and red shading represent values above the 80th (Warm) and 90th (Hot) percentile, respectively; regions shaded in light and dark blue indicate values below the 20th (Cool) and 10th (Cold) percentile, with respect to the 1981-2010 climatology. Notes: The percentiles shown in the map indicate a ranking of rainfall, with the 0th percentile being the driest and the 100th percentile being the wettest in the 1981-2010 climatology. Green and dark green shading represent values above the 80th (Wet) and 90th (Very Wet) percentile, respectively; regions shaded in light and dark brown indicate rainfall below the 20th (Dry) and 10th (Very Dry) percentile, with respect to the 1981-2010 climatology. Grey areas on the map mask out regions that receive less than 10 mm/month of rainfall on normal in the 1981-2010 climatology for the month. Outlooks: Notes for use

Outlooks for months 4 to 6:

As forecast uncertainty generally increases with longer range the 4-6-month outlook is less reliable than the 1-3 month outlook. Outlook information will only be provided when the model data signals likely outcomes. Additionally, the longer range outlook utilises fewer models because not all seasonal models are available for the extended range.

Information provided in this presentation should be used to raise early awareness of potential hazards only and should be updated with the 3-month outlook when available.

Climatological odds:

A forecast is only provided in the outlooks where there is information in the model data about likely outcomes. Therefore, where the likelihoods for above, near- and below- normal conditions are evenly balanced the phrase 'climatological odds' will be used. This means the outcome could fall anywhere within the possible climatological range. Near-normal conditions should not necessarily be assumed, and users should update with shorter-term forecasts when available.

Technical notes

The WMO lead centre for long-range forecast multi-model ensemble (LC-LRFMME) produce a probabilistic multi-model mean forecast product in which the multi-model mean is based on uncalibrated model output with a model weighting system that accounts for errors in both the forecast probabilisty and ensemble mean. The method used by LC-LRFMME separately computes a probabilistic forecast and calculates tercile probabilities with respect to climatology for each individual model, before creating the weighted multi-model mean. In seasonal prediction, shifts in the tercile probabilities are always closely associated with the shifts in the probability of extremes, and we can use the probability of terciles to provide information on the likelihood of above- or below- normal conditions. The thresholds used in the forecast summaries are defined below.

Seasonal forecasts rely on the aspects of the global weather and climate system that are more predictable, such as tropical sea-surface temperatures or the El Niño—Southern Oscillation (ENSO). However, whilst such forecasts may be able to show what is more or less likely to occur, they acknowledge that other outcomes are possible.

In addition, forecast uncertainty generally increases with longer range so the 6-month outlook is less reliable. It is also based on less information, because not all models are available to this range. Therefore the information presented here should be used to raise early awareness of potential hazards, and should be updated with the 3-month outlook when available.

In the report and tables precipitation is referred to as rainfall but in fact encompasses any form of water, liquid or solid, falling from the sky. Temperatures are the (2 metre) near-surface temperature.
